




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PCM's Purple Ribbon for Peace Awardees

Several months ago, when Pat Valaer and Mary Hanna approached us, to tell us that we are the **2017 Purple Ribbon for Peace Awardees**, we were/are humbled. Our immediate thoughts: *We haven't done enough to deserve this recognition.* We couldn't decline, though, as Mary and Pat wouldn't allow it. And so ... the honor forced us to reflect on our life together, and especially on our path for peace.

Our journey for peace began about 54 years ago in 1962. Newly married, we were in our early twenties when we moved from Grand Rapids to Detroit in togetherness. Our Catholic educational backgrounds and a trio of children, born in the 1960s, led Carol to an Eastside Mothers for Peace group

during the Viet Nam War. Ron's early exposure to the writings of Thomas Merton and Political Science background also led to a steadfast anti-war stance. Through those early years, lectures from Dr. Helen Caldicott, Bishop Tom Gumbleton, Sr. Joan Chittister, Phil Berrigan, as well as the work and writings of Dorothy Day; in later years meeting Fr. Tom Lumpkin, Fr. Peter Dougherty, Fr. Fred Thelen, Fr. John Dear and many more contemporary peacemakers that we've met through PCM, like yourselves, entered our psyches.

In the very early days of PCM, we attended a session held in Detroit led by Barbara Beasley, Elaine Pero, and Chris Doby which was to formulate local Pax Christi groups in the Detroit area. We joined with Sr. Sue Schreiber, who was teaching at Dominican High School at that time, in Detroit, located on the east side of the city where we lived. Our group called "Pax Christi East" met regularly for many years; first at Dominican High School and then at St. Jude Catholic Church.

Over the years we encouraged each other and participated in demonstrations for peace and nonviolence, locally; in Washington, DC; Ft. Benning, Georgia; Williams International in Walled Lake; as well as other marches, lectures, and especially prayer services.

We supported Focus: Hope, a Detroit civil rights organization, participating in their yearly marches and other capacities; and for a few years Carol was an employee there.

We served two terms on PC Michigan state council.

Attended numerous state and national PC conferences. We wrote stories and photographed events ... our photo albums, a photo PCM history, remain in the PCM archives.

For a period of time we took a back seat to peace activism as family responsibilities grew ... our little family of three youngsters, grew to include a daughter-in-law, and two sons-in-law, six grandchildren, and one grand-daughter-in-law, and aging parents in Grand Rapids.

Yet, we never lost our Faith in the peace message of Jesus Christ, always supporting such organizations for peace and social justice. In more recent years we again joined the PCM state council, and helped to re-invigorate the leadership. We support Pax Christi, Kay Lasante Health Clinic in Haiti, and Meta Peace Team financially as well as Day House in Detroit which is dear to our hearts as is our current St. Ignatius of Antioch Catholic Community.

The two of us together continue in God's work of peacemaking. We continue to be a quiet example to our family and friends. And "so we go forward." Thank You, as we are honored to receive this Purple Ribbon for Peace Award.


Introducing this year’s Young Peace Activist: KEZIA CURTIS

A life-long Detroit, Kezia Curtis is a nonviolence trainer, restorative justice facilitator, human rights activist, and community organizer. Kezia is a grower and preparer of healthy food, a bicycle mechanic, a writer, and wise friend who models revolutionary nonviolence by insisting on the practice of self-care and nourishing relationships in order to stay grounded and healthy for the long haul.

Kezia was introduced to Kingian nonviolence as a senior at Martin Luther King, Jr. Senior High School. After practicing nonviolence for several years and studying conflict resolution, Kezia became certified as a Level 2 trainer by the Center for Nonviolence and Peace Studies Program at the University of Rhode Island in 2012. Since that time, Kezia has offered Kingian training and leadership workshops to youth in Detroit and beyond in a variety of settings, including after-school and summer programs.

In addition to working as a Kingian nonviolence trainer, Kezia works with the Detroit Restorative Justice Center and volunteers with Michigan-Meta Peace Team. In 2015, Kezia served on MPT’s Fall Olive Harvest Team to the West Bank and is currently part of MPT’s International Planning Team.

In 2014, Kezia was the recipient of the Michigan Coalition for Human Rights Young Activist Award, and later joined the Board where Kezia has been an active and vital youth leader. Since joining the board, Kezia has served as a responder to an event on marriage equality, was a panelist on an intergenerational panel entitled, “Black Lives Matter - Then and Now,” and volunteered as an organizer and mentor for MCHR’s Freedom Tour 2016, a ten-day tour of the South for high school students that connected the civil rights movement of the past to the human rights struggles of today. same summer, Kezia was a *Fellowship of Reconciliation* scholarship recipient.

This past November, Kezia was arrested along with others from Black Lives Matter and Black Youth Project 100 in a beautiful and bold nonviolent action for chaining themselves to a police precinct door (unused) as part of a national Freedom Now day of actions against police brutality.

Kezia comes from a family of community builders and visionaries who started Feed em Freedom Growers, a community group and resource committed to growing community relationships through the cultivation of food, hearts and minds.

Kezia is a consummate peacemaker and, in the words of Bayard Rustin, an “angelic troublemaker” committed to waging love on behalf of a world that needs healing.

Pax Christi Michigan proudly presents Kezia with the Young Peace Activist award....Because she is someone who consistently “walks her talk”, she is truly a model for us all, no matter what our age.


PCM'S STATEMENT ON GUN VIOLENCE

Significantly more deaths from gun violence occur each year in the United States than any other developed nation in the world. A February 2016 American Journal of Medicine study reveals that, with 10.2 deaths from firearms per 100,000 citizens in 2010, the U.S. suffered nearly three times the rate of fatalities as any other country in the study. The Brady Center to Prevent Gun Violence estimates that between 2009 and 2013 nearly 109,000 people were shot in the U.S. each year, with an average of 32,964 dying from their wounds annually, including 2,624 children and teens. The effective lack of restrictions on access to guns contributes to gun violence. The Washington Post reports that Americans now own an astonishing 112.6 guns per 100 citizens, compared to the worldwide average of just 10.2 guns per 100 persons.

Numerous mass shootings have scarred the American landscape: Sandy Hook, Columbine, Orlando, San Bernardino, Charleston, Aurora and Virginia Tech are among the communities where innocent lives have been lost. After each devastating incident, gun advocates and their primary spokesman, National Rifle Association (NRA) CEO Wayne LaPierre, respond by calling for more guns and fewer gun safety laws, and by accusing those calling for greater gun safety of “politicizing” tragedy. Hopes for reasonable federal gun control legislation are stymied with Congress effectively “bought off” by the NRA, with \$650,000 in donations to members of Congress in the 2012 election, and over \$808,000 in 2014.

Special mention must be made of what Pax Christi USA, in its July 2016 Statement on Racial Violence in the U.S. calls “a crisis of racism and fear – political and media sources brand certain people as presumptive enemies. Our uncivil political rhetoric, amplified by the media, reinforces the fear of whole groups of people: young black men, Muslims, undocumented immigrants, members of the LGBTQ community. This only serves to fan racism, bigotry and the ‘blaming of victims’ of impoverishment and marginalization.” It is essential to involve such marginalized communities in the search for solutions to gun violence.

The Hebrew prophets repeatedly warned against idolatry; as a prime example, placing trust in weapons. “God will judge between nations and render decisions for many peoples. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation will not lift up the sword against an-



other, nor will they train for war anymore.” (Isaiah 2:4). In the wake of the Newtown tragedy, the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism posed the question, “Is the need for sensible gun-control a religious issue?” Its Director, Rabbi David Saperstein answered, drawing on the same prophetic tradition of his faith: “You bet it is. The indiscriminate distribution of guns is an offense against God and humanity. Our gun-flooded, violence prone society has turned weapons into idols. And the appropriate religious response to idolatry is sustained moral outrage.”

The Catholic Church has, as the American bishops remind us, “... been a consistent voice for the promotion of peace at home and around the world and a strong advocate for the reasonable regulation of firearms.” In his January 1, 2014 World Day of Peace message, Pope Francis proclaimed, “I appeal forcefully to all those who sow violence and death by force of arms: in the person you today see simply as an enemy to be beaten, discover rather your brother or sister, and hold back your hand! Give up the way of arms and go out to meet the other in dialogue, pardon and reconciliation, in order to rebuild justice, trust, and hope around you!”

Pax Christi Michigan agrees that “reasonable regulation of firearms” is urgently needed, and long overdue. Specifically, we advocate comprehensive federal legislation, that would:

1. Require universal background checks on all prospective firearms and ammunition purchasers, including at gun shows and on private in-person or online gun sales;
2. Require a waiting period of a specified number of days between a firearm purchase and when it is physically transferred to the purchaser;
3. Require persons seeking to purchase or possess a firearm to: obtain a firearm safety certificate by successfully completing a safety training course; register their firearms and obtain a license; notify law enforcement when their weapons are lost or stolen; and, safely store their firearms and ammunition in the home to prevent access by children and other unauthorized users;
4. Require gun dealers to obtain a local permit, conduct employee background checks, and obtain liability insurance;
5. Ban semi-automatic assault weapons and large capacity ammunition magazines;
6. Ban licensed and unlicensed open carry of loaded and unloaded firearms;
7. Require the personalization of handguns, that is, equipping them with technology that prevents them from firing when operated by an unauthorized user; and, prohibit the manufacture, importation, purchase and transfer of non-personalized handguns;
8. Legalize comprehensive ballistic identification through “microstamping” technology;
9. Repeal the “Dickey Amendment” that prevents the Center for Disease Control from spending funds “to advocate or promote gun control,” and restore funding for research on gun violence;
10. Offer a gun buyback opportunity to private gun owners, without fear of prosecution; and,
11. Pass campaign finance reform and reverse the Supreme Court’s Citizens United decision to reduce the role of money in the U.S. political system, and to diminish the role of lobbying.

As part of the Catholic peace and justice movement that seeks to model the Peace of Christ, Pax Christi Michigan considers the current situation, with gun violence ravaging our families and communities and terrorizing our children, to be unconscionable. With this Statement on Gun Violence, we declare unequivocally that we reject gun violence, and that we follow the One who said, “Peter, put away your sword.”


Challenging the Just War Theory

Pope Francis announces the theme for the 50th World Day of Peace (January 1st, 2017) "Non-Violence: A Style of Politics for Peace"

Violence and Peace are at the origin of two opposite ways to building society.

The proliferation of hotbeds of violence produces most serious negative social consequences.

The Holy Father sums up this situation in the expression: "A Third World War in Pieces". Peace, by contrast, promotes social positive consequences and it allows the achievement of real progress. Therefore, we should act within what is possible, and negotiate ways of peace even where they seem tortuous and impractical. Thus, non-violence can acquire a more comprehensive and new meaning. It will not only consist of desire, of moral rejection of violence, barriers, destructive impulses, but also of a realistic political method that gives rise to hope.



Such a political method is based on the primacy of law. If the rights and the equal dignity of every person are safeguarded without any discrimination and distinction, then non-violence, understood as a political method, can constitute a realistic way to overcome arm conflicts. In this

perspective, it becomes important to increasingly recognize not the right of force but the force of right.

With this Message, Pope Francis wants to show a further step, a path of hope, appropriate to today's historical circumstances. In this way, the settlement of disputes may be reached through negotiation without then degenerating into armed conflict. Within such a perspective the culture and identity of Peoples are respected and the opinion that some are morally superior to others is overcome. At the same time, however, it does not mean that one Nation can remain indifferent to the tragedies of another. Rather it means a recognition of the primacy of diplomacy over the noise of arms. Arms trade is so widespread that it is generally underestimated. Illegal arms trafficking supports not a few world's conflicts. Non-violence as a political style can and must do much to stem this scourge.



There is no such thing as a "just" war. It's just war. And it's antithetical to the Gospel.

- ◆ PCM's cosponsored, with Meta Peace Team and Michigan State University, "**A Nonviolent Response to Fear and Hate**": two days that featured a presentation and then a skills training in reaction to the spike in hate crimes following the presidential election. The training - held Dec. 3rd - was one of the largest in MPT's history, and ensured that there are at least 130 more people trained in violence de-escalation skills.
- ◆ On February 4th, PCM State Coordinator **Mary Hanna**, Treasurer **Pat Valaer**, State Council member **Fred Thelen** all took part in the annual **Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Prayer Breakfast**, in Lansing, Michigan. Many other PCM members were in attendance to celebrate this wonderful ecumenical event. The breakfast is hosted by **Action of Greater Lansing** (part of the national Gamaliel Network), of which PCM is a member. Representative Getchen Whitmer (D) was one of the keynote speakers.
- ◆ At the invitation of Pax Christi Metro D.C., Pax Christi Michigan has signed on to **support the BDS Movement** (Boycott/Divest/Sanction) in support of the people of Palestine. It was informative and deeply inspiring; there was ample material to spend months meditating on. And Mary Hanna provided the group with valuable tips on how to keep oneself going for the long haul by taking care of one’s own spiritual well-being. She was wonderfully hands-on and practical. We all came away with numerous resources and lots to ponder.



The prayer services were exceptional too - well-chosen readings, appropriate times of silence, excellent music. God’s Spirit of love and joy was indeed present bringing us closer together and strengthening our shared vision.


This retreat was truly a highlight of our year. You are welcome to make it a highlight of your year in 2017.

PAX CHRISTI MICHIGAN MEMBERS ATTEND THE PREMIER OF **AMERICAN PROPHET**



After a years in development, the Detroit Community Premiere of "*American Prophet*" was presented to a standing-room-only crowd.

Set in 1968, one year after the riots that devastated Detroit, "*American Prophet*" tells the story of Thomas Gumbleton, a young man suddenly appointed to a position of great authority whose leadership must guide a community in a time of great upheaval and change. As the United States' newest--and youngest--Roman Catholic bishop, Tom is faced with a city filled with uncertainty and a community divided by anger. With settings ranging from the segregated parishes of Detroit to the humble homes of parishioners and the hockey rinks where Tom and his friends--the United States' only hockey team for priests--play, "*American Prophet*" is a unique glimpse at a past whose struggles resonate to our day and as well as the portrait of a young man who learns to come into his own.

The premiere screening took place in the beautiful Detroit Film Theatre (located within the Detroit Institute of Arts) at 7pm on Sunday, October 23rd. Free of charge, audience members were invited to donate to Kay Lasante Clinic in Port au Prince, Haiti where Bishop Gumbleton would be bringing relief supplies to the victims of Hurricane Matthew in southwest Haiti.

Following the film, which received a standing ovation, there was a question & answer session with **Bishop Tom Gumbleton** himself and director **Jasmine Rivera**. And although the evening was scheduled to end with a reception and chance to meet the cast and crew, the attendance at the premier was so overwhelming that organizers were forced to announce that there was literally not enough room for everyone to attend the reception!

"*American Prophet*" was made possible through the tireless commitment and generosity of donors and volunteers from Detroit's peace and justice communities, including Pax Christi Michigan, as well as the Friends of the Detroit Film Theatre and the Detroit Institute of the Arts.

This film is a masterful celebration of the life and legacy of Bishop Thomas Gumbleton as a peacemaker. You are left with a sense of both hope, and anticipation of "where do we go from here?". When director **Jasmine Rivera** announced that they hoped to expand the film into a full feature-length production, there was unanimous support and another standing ovation. Local Group Updates

Former PCM Young Peacemaker Award Recipient and PCM Member Group Join Take on Hate Campaign

University of Detroit Jesuit's JustPeace co-curricular has partnered with the **Take on Hate** campaign initiated by ACCESS (Arab Community Center for Economic and Services), a local nonprofit organization, in response to the increase of hate crimes that have been reported over the past few years. Although the Take on Hate campaign began in response to Islamophobia, the campaign has broadened to include all groups that are targeted because of their race, religion, culture, gender, sexual orientation, or legal status. JustPeace got involved in the **Take on Hate** campaign last year when one of our students, Aakif Lodhi, organized an educational event on Islam after a controversy at a local Catholic high school erupted when parents complained about the school's providing space for its Muslim students to pray. The action step following Aakif's talk was a commitment to work on a **Take on Hate** campaign among our students.

On Nov. 29, JustPeace organized a petition drive during all lunch periods, inviting students, staff, and faculty, to commit to interrupting harassment and intimidation by signing pledge cards, wearing a Take on Hate pin, and studying techniques for intervening in instances of hateful behavior. Members of the ACCESS Take on Hate campaign came by to support the students and film their efforts in order to promote the campaign among other high schools in the state. UDJ is the first **Take on Hate** high school in Michigan.




